Capacity building is an enabler for better governance:

- Necessary, but not sufficient
- Empower actors to make better decisions by providing unbiased, accurate information.
- Facilitate knowledge sharing mechanisms
- Promote south-south cooperation

Thinking outside the box: a technical example

Bringing technical issues to decision makers: harvest control rules and the implementation of the precautionary approach

- Requires partneship science-management, with continuing follow up
- Scientists are not always the best communicators
- Consistency in the message across audiences
- Online tools; videos and interactive animations
